



EAST COURSE COURSE GUIDE



Back in the mid 1980's Brian Turner a Canadian Entrepreneur had the idea of creating a superior golf complex on what was then the Little Horsted Estate in East Sussex. So successful was his vision that when it finally came to fruition East Sussex National was soon recognised as one of the Premier Golf Venues in Europe. Robert E Cupp, an American course architect who was regularly used by Jack Nicklaus, designed the 2 courses together with the 3 Hole Academy course. Both courses were to be the first "Stadium Courses" to be constructed in Europe with greens developed to a USGA specification which provides excellent drainage and putting surfaces that would match any of the major Championship courses.

To compliment the outstanding quality of the courses it was necessary to build a luxurious clubhouse with facilities that gave the complex the touch of class it deserved. The entire complex was completed at the beginning of the 1990's.

Since opening, the Club has attracted a host of Championships, which include the European Open in 1993 and 1994, 5 European Challenge Tour Events, 4 PGA European Tour Qualifying Schools between 1994 and 1997 plus numerous other golf tournaments.

During the time it has been opened some of the Worlds greatest golfers have taken up the challenge set by Robert E Cupp including the likes of Vi Jay Singh, Ernie Els, Nick Faldo, Colin Montgomery together with the 2005 Ryder Cup Captain Ian Woosnam MBE.

Both courses have several signature holes which makes East Sussex National a true test of golf.

To name but a few ...

- 12 West A demanding par 5 with out of bounds either side of the drive followed by a difficult 2nd shot with water on the right and trees on the left culminating in a plateau green guarded by a severe pot bunker and water around 1/2 the perimeter of the green.
- 16 West An innocuous looking par 3 that catches out many a golfer.
- 17 West Another demanding. Par 5, look-out for the lone oak tree on the right, which John Daly carried from the Championship tees!
- 18 West A truly remarkable finishing hole, demanding an accurate drive onto a tree-lined fairway followed by a shot into a heavily guarded green with the backdrop of the magnificent clubhouse beyond.
- This marks the start of one of the toughest series of finishing holes in Golf. A long par 4 with a substantial carry from the tee followed by the 2nd shot into a plateau green where club selection is paramount.
- 16 East A par 3 over water with bunkers guarding the front and the back of the green.
- 17 East Here you have to be careful not to run out of fairway by driving into the lake. Having negotiated the drive, a 2nd shot, again over water, needs to find a generous but well contoured green.
- One of the most demanding finishing holes in golf. Measuring 454 yards off the Championship tees this uphill par 4 is waiting to catch out even the finest golfers. Playing East Sussex Nationals is a truly memorable experience. The courses are both designed to the highest standard, the greens provide an excellent test of your putting skills and after your round you can enjoy the opulence of the clubhouse that awaits you.



PAR 4 | STROKE INDEX 14


A bold drive down the right and close to the water will open up an easier approach to a very narrow green.

2ND HOLE

PAR 5 | STROKE INDEX 12


A drive left of centre avoiding the guarding bunkers allows a straight – forward second shot past the single oak tree. Longer hitters will expect to get up in 2 and set up that eagle chance.



3RD HOLE


PAR 4 | STROKE INDEX 8

A wide fairway, aim slightly right of centre. Beware the line of bunkers on your approach shot to a large contoured green.

4TH HOLE

PAR 3 | STROKE INDEX 10

No bunkers, but a steep slope guards the front of this large green. Check the pin postition for your clubbing.
